Robert (Bobby) Graves spoke at the May meeting about his trip on the Honor Flight to the Nation's Capital. Bobby said that they departed Eugene, stopped, and picked up more veterans in Albany, and then on to Portland. There was a Coast Guard Honor Guard at PDX. Of his group there were 2 World War II vets, and 4 Korean War/Era vets. He said that all of them were very overwhelmed, honored, and humbled by the experience and treatment that they received.

They visited all the museums, monuments, and laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. It was raining while at the tomb. He said that thing that really stood out to him there was the stark difference between how the soldiers walk their post as compared to other countries who go through loud gyrations. He said the Silence and Respect truly makes it the most reverent place of honor.

They had dinner and a program of recognition and thanks at the Arlington Elks Club. The local Young Marines group served the dinner. Bobby said that he and another veteran buddy of his started a hat passing to raise money for those Young Marines. There was a substantial amount of money raised to support those outstanding Young Marines.

Upon arriving back to Portland, Bobby was the first one off the plane and all the veterans were treated with Bagpipes. When they noticed he was a Marine, the bagpiper began playing the Marine's Hymn.

He emphasized again how truly Honored and Humbled he was to be recognized for his service during this whole experience. He stated that anyone who qualifies and has not taken an Honor Flight to do so.

On 17 May 2024, Emerald Empire Detachment #917 Junior Vice-Commandant Paul Grinde attended the Gary Sinise Foundation Home Dedication event for Josh Geddis and his family. Their forever home is specially made for his needs due to his injuries.



Joshua Geddis



U.S. Navy Petty Officer 1st Class (Ret.), Navy Seabees



Joshua Geddis always remembers wanting to join the military, and one day, after a call from the Navy recruiter, he signed right up. Joshua joked, "It must have been one of the easiest recruitments he had in a while." Following Basic Training and school, Joshua was stationed in Gulfport, MS. He made three deployments to Japan/Indonesia, Iraq, and the Philippines before transferring to Oak Harbor, WA, where he made his last two deployments to East Africa.

On January 16, 2017, while deployed to East Africa he was upgrading the securities of the Forward Operating Base, when one of the barriers became unstable and fell on top of Joshua, crushing him with 4,500 pounds of weight. Although he was quickly unpinned, due to the extreme mass, his L1 burst causing Joshua to lose feeling below his waist, leaving him paraplegic.

Joshua's road to recovery wasn't easy, but his spirits remained unwavering. His mentality is, "Can't be sad, that won't help. Being mad at yourself for something you cannot control doesn't help anybody." And so, he continued to thrive as best he could with his new norm.

Joshua looks forward to everything a Gary Sinise Foundation specially adapted, smart-technology home will bring him. It will empower him at home, easing his way of life. Joshua said, "I just want to be comfortable in my daily life and being here makes it harder. It's simply things that people don't think about that really make a difference in a house. Having roll under sinks, a work area in the kitchen, more than one door to get in and out of the house, being able to get into the kids' rooms (just to see if it is really clean), and a garbage disposal switch I could reach would make things so much easier and improve life."

The Gary Sinise Foundation looks forward to building Joshua a home to ease his daily struggles and mobility needs around the home.

While there I met Travis Reynders, a Marine, who works for the Gary Sinise Foundation.





I also met the Department of Oregon Junior Vice-Commandant William "Bulldog" Sump. William had heard of the event from a Veteran Motorcycle Rider he has known for many years.



I also met two representatives from Amazon - Military. One from Boise, Idaho and the other from Virginia. Both are Marines and work for Amazon in providing the tech items needed for the Smart Home. The Idaho Marine was in survey during his time in, and the Virginia Marine retired from the United States Marine Corps and was in Amtracs.

Detachment members Debbie Barker, Lois Price and Stephen Price attended the Springfield Memorial Day event to honor Airman Trinity Reinhart.



On September 16, 2023, while serving at an US Air Force base in northeast Colorado, Airman Trinity Reinhart of Springfield was killed in a Humvee accident just two months shy of her 20th Birthday. 1st Lt. Joshua Beerbower said, "She was truly exceptional and always willing to help others, no matter the situation – she loved what she did as a defender."

The City of Springfield, along with its partner Willamalane, and the American Legion Post #40 in Springfield, honored and remembered Airman Reinhart on Memorial Day, 2024, with a plaque dedication and tree planting near the Women Veterans Memorial at the Springfield Veterans Plaza. Mayor Sean VanGordon and Lane County Commissioner David Loveall provided remarks as part of the program.



The event started with a F15 flyover by Kingsley Field, Home of the 173rd Fighter Wing of the Oregon Air National Guard.
